Average proportion of online bachelor's students who were employed.

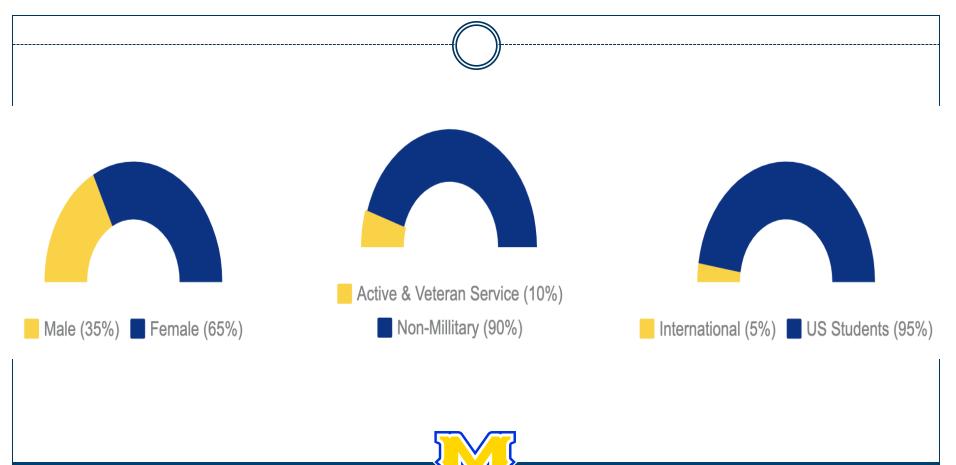


New entrants at ranked online schools previously completed college courses.

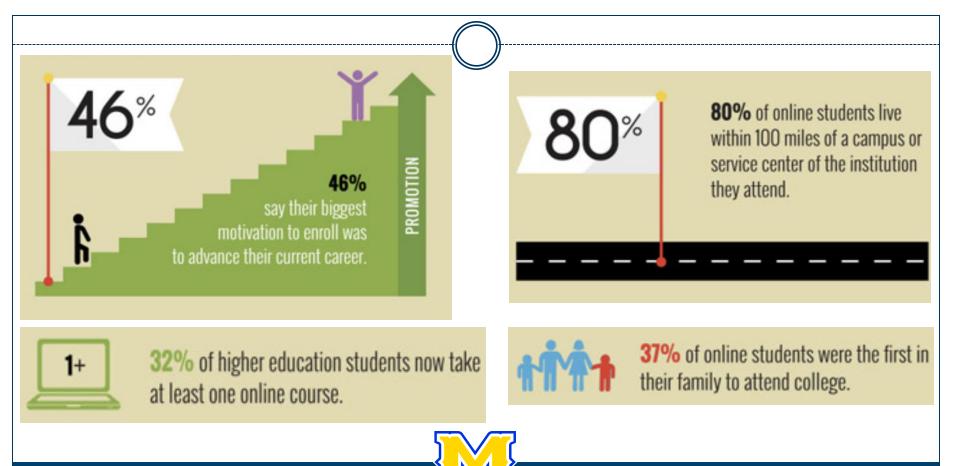

Grade Forgiveness

- Full Policy can be found on the following webpage: <u>www.mcneese.edu/policy/grade_forgiveness_policy</u>
- No transfer work is allowed for the course being repeated, omitted, or the repeated attempt.
- One for one replacement
 - Each approved grade forgiveness removes only one prior grade not all prior grades.





Grade Forgiveness - cont...

- Only one per form
 - Don't put a forgiveness and an omission on the same form.
- If repeating, don't approve until grades are officially posted and the student is registered for the course again.
 - The grade must be a "D" or "F", which is not known until grades are officially posted.
 - The section code is required for the new attempt and is not known with certainty until the student actually registers.





Alternate Pin Reminders

• Make sure to check the term in Banner Self Service.

- Make sure the student is admitted.
 - If the student sits out for a semester, they MUST reapply for admission and be accepted.





Alternate Pin Reminders – cont...

- If you cannot see the alternate pin, <u>do not</u> have students call or go to Student Central for someone in the Registrars Office to give them their Alternate Pin.
 - We do not know if the student has been advised; therefore, we cannot give students their alternate pin.
 - If you cannot see the alternate pin, check with your department head, administrative assistant or **you** can call us.





Degree Works/Graduation

- Remember to enter petitions for students as they are needed.
 - Do not wait until the student is ready to graduate to enter all petitions.
 - If the student was advised to take a course but has not yet registered, please enter the petition. Make sure to include that the student was advised to take the course in the upcoming semester.
- Advising notes in Degree Works are very helpful especially for Athletic Certification.





Degree Works/Graduation – cont...

- The Application for Degree should be filled out when the student is advised for their final semester.
 - If a student does not graduate that semester, a new application for degree is required for the next semester they plan to graduate.



Request to be Certified with Veteran's Educational Assistance Program

- Only complete the form after the student has actually registered for courses.
 - Don't forget to sign the form.
- Prerequisites (including developmental courses) for major courses are eligible for benefits.
- Repeated courses are not eligible for benefits.
 Ourless the course is repeatable for credit.



Banner 9

- McNeese has updated Banner System screens from Banner 8 to Banner 9.
- Banner 8 and Banner 9 are both available for use at this time, but at any time during 2019, Banner 8 may become inaccessible.
- Screen names are the same but navigation is much different.







Banner 9 – cont...

- Training for department heads and administrative assistants is currently under way.
- We are also expecting Banner Self-Service updates in 2019.

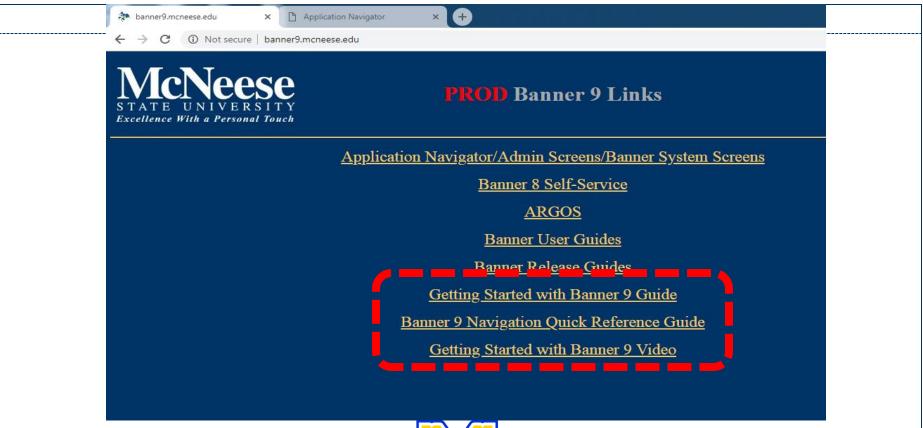

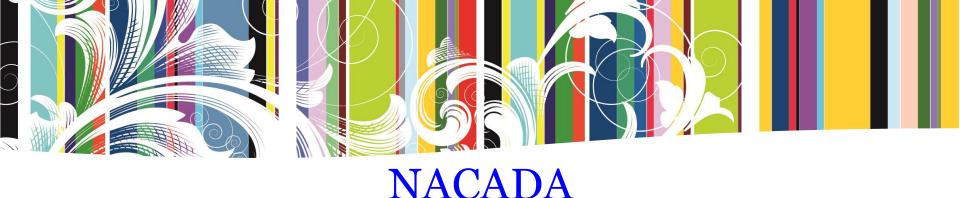

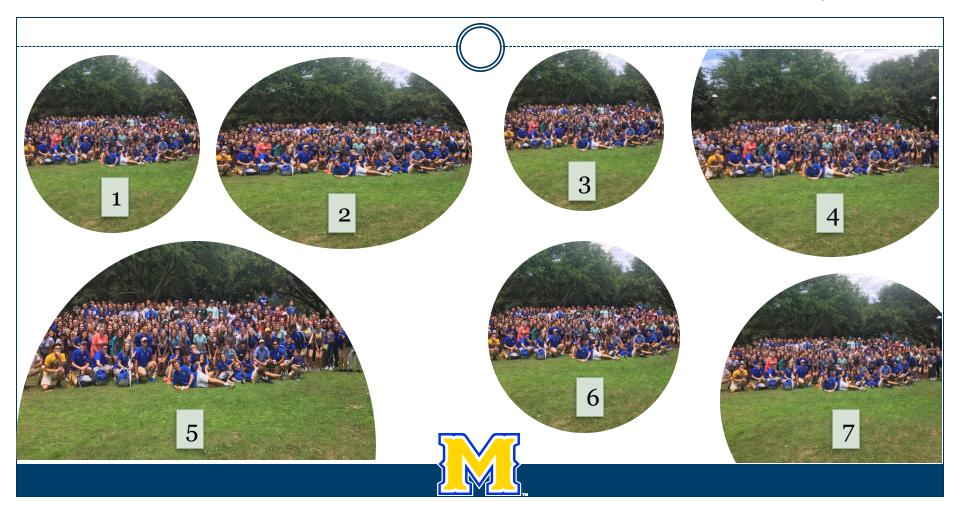

- Reflection: Speak to the class directly before the class advising session so they do not make appointments. Develop an inclass assignment related to the advising session to turn in.

Large Group Advising Reflection

- Begin with speaking to the class a few weeks before the group advising to avoid students making one-on-one appointments.
- Suggest the students come prepared with an outlined proposed course schedule.
- Students need some sort of incentive to better guarantee attendance.

HOW TO REGISTER ONLINE

I. Go to www.mcneese.edu and click on STUDENT CENTRAL tab. At the top of the page, click on the yellow BANNER SELF-SERVICE button

2. Once on the Banner screen, click on Enter Secure Area.

3. Type in New User ID (which is your McNeese ID# starting with 000) and PIN.

a. If this is your first time registering on Banner Self-Service, your PIN should be your BIRTHDAY in the following format mmddvv (for example April 24, 1998 = 042498). b. First-time users will be asked to change their PIN for safety and security reasons. You will also be asked to

create security questions. c. If you are having problems with your PIN, go to the Registrar's Office to reset your PIN.

Click on <u>Student and Financial Aid</u> and then on <u>Registration</u>.
 Click on <u>Class Search</u> and select the Term (Semester/Year) to look up class availability

a. In the Subject box, find the subject and click on it. Once you click the subject, it will be highlighted in blue. b. In the Course Number box, type in the three-digit class number on your advising sheet.

c. Scroll down, click on "Class Search".

d. Find the course that you want to register for and write down the CRN # (The CRN is 'item number' for the

particular class & each class has a unique number.) 6. Once your schedule is planned, close the Class Search window and return to the Banner Self-Service window. 7. Click on Register & Add/Drop Classes and then select the term.

8. You will be asked to enter the ALTERNATE PIN that you received from your advisor for that semester.

9. Enter all the CRN #'s at the bottom of the Registration Page. Once you have entered the CRNs, click Submit Changes. ~ Any changes to your schedule are made here too

10. To print out a schedule, click on "Return to Menu" at the top of the webpage and click on Printable Schedule. NOTES

How Faculty and Staff View Advising



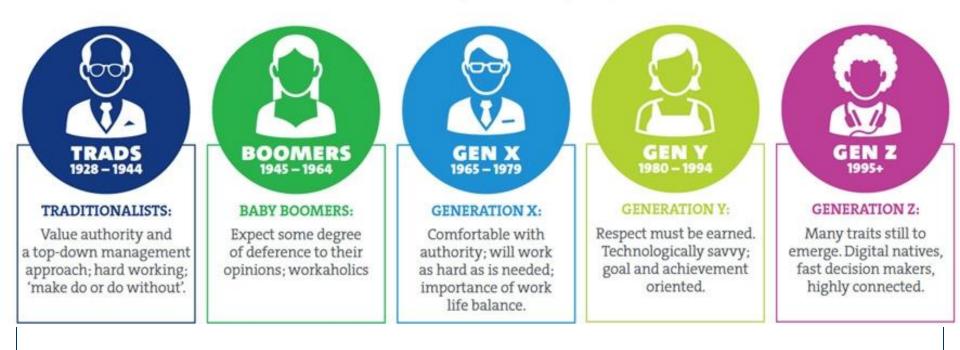






SO WHO ARE THE DIFFERENT GENERATIONS?

Who Are We Helping?

- Generation Z
 - Born from 1995 to 2010
 - They are the most diverse generation so they are more openminded and accepting.
 - Referred to as "iGen" technology is inherent and expected
 - Average college student brings 8 pieces of technology to school.
 - It is easy for them to multi-task.
 - They prefer face to face communication.
 - Finances are a big concern for Gen Z.
 - They want you to keep it short and to the point.



ADVISING 101 – Notify Students

- When students are moved from Basic Studies to their department.
 - Send the student an email introducing yourself to the student. Include your name, email, office hours and office location.
 - > Your advisee's email can be accessed in your Banner Self Service under Advisee Listing.
- Advising and Registration
 - Send reminder email
 - Use social media
 - Inform students during class
 - Don't rely just on the campus calendar or campus social media





ADVISING 101 – Advising & Registration

- Advising Appointments
 - Provide a way for the student to make an appointment (i.e. Google Docs)
 - Advising appointments should last around 20 to 30 minutes
 - Make sure you are there for the appointment
 - Seem interested in the student
 - Provide different ways of advising for your students
- Registration
 - Advising and registration goes beyond official advising.
 - We still need to be available for advising after official advising period ends.





ADVISING 101 – The Appointment

- Document everything!!!
- Before discussing the next semester, talk about the current semester and midterm grades.
- When advising, provide the student with the following:
 - Courses to be taken during next semester
 - Alternate courses
 - Check for holds
 - Alternate pin
 - Registration date and time
 - Registration directions and puzzle paper



ADVISING 101 – The Appointment

- Don't forget...
 - Help the students map out their classes over 4 years
 - Discuss information on major (Internships/Service Learning Opportunities)
 - Provide information on the following:

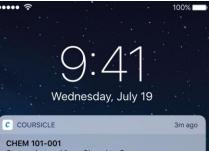
